Above is a list of influential people who are of AA, NH, or PI heritage. Choose one person to research and study. You should spend at least thirty minutes researching and brainstorming ideas before you begin decorating your page. Use a standard size piece of blank paper (8.5 x 11) or you may use a template provided for you.

Below is a list of what should be included on your page:

- Include the full name of the person you research.
- Specify where this person is from and where they grew up.
- Include a title of work, group, occupation, or event that this person is most famous for.
- Include one or more quotations from the person you are studying.
- Include three or more words that describe the person's personality.
- Include four or more illustrations/graphic images that symbolize the person's life.
- Include five or more facts about the person that you've learned about.
- You must fill the entire page. You don't want a lot of empty space (if any).
- Your page must be colored.

Grading Rubric

Overall Appearance	Your page is detailed and neat. Images are clear and text is easy to read. The overall appearance is creative and aesthetically pleasing.	10 Points
Research	Your work shows you have done thorough research for the project. Your facts are accurate and relevant.	10 Points
Information	The facts you present are meaningful and were carefully chosen. You clearly depict the person's impact on society.	10 Points
Graphics	You chose illustrations that highlight important parts of the person's life. The graphic elements are neat, colored, and are incorporated seamlessly into the work.	10 Points
Writing Conventions	You use proper grammar, punctuation, spelling, and usage in your analysis.	10 Points
