Punctuation Rules

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Rule 1: Use commas to separate words in a series

I need to buy sugar, milk, and bread from the store.

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The Oxford Comma

The Oxford comma is the last comma in a series. This comma is important because without it, the meaning of the sentence will change.

Joe thanked my parents, John Doe, and Nancy Doe.

With the Oxford comma: it indicates Joe thanked four people (your parents, John, and also Nancy.)

Joe thanked my parents, John Doe and Nancy Doe.

With no comma: it indicates Joe thanked two people (your parents who are named John and Nancy.)

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Rule 2: Use a comma after numerical words when they introduce elements in a series

In order to get good grades in school, you must do the following: first, attend class; second, do your homework; and third, study.

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Rule 3: Use commas to set off a direct quotation

“I can’t dive well,” said Larry, “but I can swim pretty fast.”

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Rule 4: Use a comma after an introductory word or phrase

When I lived in Hawaii, I would go surfing all the time.

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Rule 5: Use commas between coordinate adjectives that describe the same noun

The happy, hungry bunnies play outside.

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Rule 6: Interrupting information in
the middle of the sentence

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Rule 7: To separate compound sentences

The comma pairs with a coordinating conjunction to connect two independent clauses.

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Coordinating Conjunctions

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(FANBOYS)

FOR, AND, NOR, BUT, OR, YET, SO

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Requires a comma:

I want to order pizza, but my sister wants to order tacos.

Does NOT require a comma:

My mom said I am not allowed to go to the mall or to the movies.

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Rule 8: To set off a free modifier at the end of a sentence
