Gerunds

Christina enjoys **listening** to music.

Listening comes from the verb **listen**.

Listen is not the verb of the sentence. **Enjoys** is the verb.

Listening to music is what the subject enjoys doing. It RECEIVES the action. It is being used as a “thing,” making it a noun.

Just because a word ends in -ing, doesn't automatically mean it's a gerund.

Make sure its not the verb of the sentence first by finding the action of the sentence.

- The aquarium needs a good **cleaning**. = GERUND
- I **am cleaning** the aquarium thoroughly. = NOT A GERUND
- Cayden is thinking about **studying** abroad. = GERUND
- Cayden **is studying** abroad next year. = NOT A GERUND

Gerund Phrase

A phrase that contains a gerund and includes all modifiers or objects associated with it

- Gabby is interested in **becoming a lawyer.**
- My son loves **playing with his toy dinosaur.**

Subject **PREVIEW**

Subject: who or what is doing the action

Betty broke her promise.

(**Broke** is the verb. **Betty** is the subject.)

Gerund as the subject:

Whining will not get you any favors.

Direct Object

Direct object: who or what receives the action

Betty broke her promise.

(**Broke** is the verb. **Promise** is the direct object.)

Gerund as the direct object:

That toddler loves **stomping** through the store.

Predicate Nominative

Predicate Nominative, also called a Predicate Noun: a noun or pronoun that directly follows a linking verb and renames the subject.
You should be able to replace the linking verb with “equals.”

Ryan **was** frustrated. Ryan = frustrated.

(**Was** is the linking verb. **Frustrated** is the predicate nominative.)

Gerund as the predicate nominative:

A good career for me is **nursing**.

A good career for me = nursing.

Object of the Preposition

Object of Preposition: the noun or pronoun that comes after a preposition.

Keep the secret **between us**.

(**Keep** is the verb. **Between** is the preposition. **Us** is the object of the preposition.)

Gerund as the object of the preposition:
Jenny plans **on swimming** for exercise.
