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Verbals

A verbal is a word that is typically a verb but is being used as a different part of speech in a sentence

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Participles

Verbs that act like adjectives

Adjectives are words that describe nouns.

Mashed potatoes and fried chicken are delicious!

Mashed comes from the verb *mash*.

Fried comes from the verb *fry*.

Both are participles since “mashed” describes *potatoes* and “fried” describes *chicken*.

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Past and Present

There are two types of participles: past and present

Past tense participles end in **-ing**

My sister and I wore **matching** jumpsuits to school.

Matching describes the jumpsuits.

Past tense participles *usually* end in **-ed**

The **frustrated** bird could not catch a worm.

Frustrated describes the bird.

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Irregular Verbs

Not all past tense verbs end in -ed.
There are irregular verbs that break the rules.

It's not **slepted**. It's **slept**.

Participle: Hidden

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Participial Phrase

A phrase that contains a participle and includes all modifiers or objects associated with it

Johnny, prepared for anything, was not afraid of the woods.

Jumping up and down, the children waited for Santa Claus.

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Participle or Gerund?

Participles = adjectives

The *singing* choir held hands.

Singing describes the choir.

Gerunds = nouns

The choir's *singing* was beautiful.

Singing is the subject of the sentence.
